**BOOSTER CLUB'S
1977 SPORTSMAN OF THE YEAR**



DR. LOU GOODWIN

As a contributor to amateur athletics and to community activities, Dr. Lou Goodwin has no peer.

Born the son of a miner in Bellevue, Alberta, Dr. Goodwin excelled in track and field, hockey, baseball, boxing and gymnastics during his school years.

In 1945, Dr. Goodwin joined the Calgary branch of the Faculty of Education (in those days an extension of the University of Alberta) where he was the entire physical education staff. He coached the men's and women's volleyball and basketball teams and the men's hockey team as well as instructing the physical education classes for all the students in the school and directing the intramural programs.

Dr. Goodwin has been the major architect in the development of the University of Calgary's Faculty of Physical Education, but he suggests that any success he has achieved is only the result of his ability to attract excellent people to work with him. "This has been my strength and now I'm basking in their reflected light", is the way he puts it.

During his career, Dr. Goodwin has served as President of the Canada West University Athletic Association and has been a member of the Board of Directors of the Canadian Intercollegiate Athletic Union. He held five two-year terms as an elected member of the Calgary Public School Board including acting as Chairman of that Board for an unprecedented five years and has also held three two-year terms as a City of Calgary alderman. He is a former director and president of the Booster Club. In 1967 he was presented with the Canada Medal as recognition for his participation in community activities.

After 30 years as the top physical education man at the University of Calgary, Dr. Goodwin is resigning as Dean this year in order that he can devote the next two years to 'getting back to the classroom' as a teaching professor.

The Booster Club is very proud to add the name of Dr. Lou Goodwin to the distinguished list of Sportsmen of the Year.

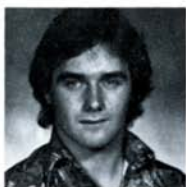

STAN JAYCOCK

Stan is a Calgary native who played baseball and hockey in the Calgary amateur sports system. He attended a U.S. college on a hockey scholarship and returned to Calgary at age 20 and won the 1955-56 Junior "B" scoring championship.

He has been associated with Junior "B" hockey not only as a player but also as a coach and an executive. He was an assistant coach for 3 years and a head coach for 10 years during which time his team won 7 league championships. For the past 10 years he has been 1st. Vice-President of the league.

Stan was an assistant coach and manager for the midget Spurs which won the Wrigley tournament in 1976. He has also spent 10 years as a baseball umpire.

At the community level, Stan has held a number of positions with Fairview Community Association and was one of the driving forces in the construction of their community arena.

LEADERSHIP



One of the highlights of Ken's career was his attendance at the international coaching clinic held last year in the Soviet Union. He has coached his own teams in the past and his ambition is to get back into the coaching area as soon as he can get a little more time.

A devoted community worker, Ken feels that he has an obligation to contribute his time and expertise in order to make improvements in the way things are being done.

KEN McINTOSH

Ken McIntosh is one of those tireless, behind-the-scenes, volunteer workers whose efforts are so vital to the success of amateur athletics. As chairman of the Ice Allocation Committee of the Minor Hockey Association, he has the thankless responsibility of assigning rinks in over 80 communities for use amongst 600 to 700 minor hockey teams, a task which certainly takes most, if not all, of his free time.

He was also one of the originators of the Minor Hockey Association's Hockey School for boys eleven years of age and under. This program has since been taken over by the City but Ken has agreed to stay and be responsible for running the school.

JEAN JARRELL

Jean Jarrell is not only one of Canada's most outstanding leaders in gymnastics, but she has also fashioned a distinguished career in aquatics.

As Chairman of the Alberta Women's Gymnastics Technical Committee, she is virtually responsible for the development of gymnastics in our province. Prior to assuming this position seven years ago, she spent three years as coach of the Alberta Women's Gymnastic Team to the National Championships. Internationally, she has acted as team manager for Canada at the British Commonwealth Games in New Zealand in 1973. She has twice managed Canadian teams that competed in Bulgaria. Last year she was

the prime organizer in the final Olympic trials and was Meet Director for the International Gymnastics Meet. She is currently a member of each of the National Women's Technical Committee and the National Team Selection Committee.

Jean is also Vice-President of the Alberta-Northwest Territories Royal Life Saving Society and has also received an Award of Excellence from that same society.

Jean, a native of High River, was named the 1976 winner of the Henry Viney Outstanding Amateur Sports Woman of the Year award.





MASTER OF CEREMONIES

ERNIE AFAGANIS

Sportcasters with degrees in Economics are about as rare as sportcasters with genuine Greek names. CBC sports commentator Ernie Manolis Afaganis, known in sporting circles as "the Golden Greek", fills the bill on both counts.

Born in Lethbridge, Alberta Afaganis attended public and high schools before graduating with a degree in economics in 1952. While at college he spent four seasons polishing his play-by-play style as he described the heroics of Eastern Washington football and basketball teams playing in the tough Evergreen Conference in the Pacific Northwest.

Ernie traded his hockey sticks, accumulated in his Junior hockey days around Lethbridge for a set of golf clubs and the captaincy of the college golf team. His team swept two consecutive Evergreen championships and golf has continued a major interest ever since. Rated one of Edmonton's best amateur golfers, he still maintains a two handicap that could be shaved even lower with just a little practise time.

Afaganis' abiding interest in sports and his play-by-play experience gained in college led to his return to Edmonton in 1953 and an announcing job in private radio as an all-night disc jockey. Later, he moved into sports and during his eight year stint, he covered everything imaginable.

Afaganis joined the CBC Edmonton in 1961. With the Corporation Ernie's career has spanned such events as the summer and winter Olympics, The Commonwealth Games, the Canadian Derby, Queen's Plate, World Hockey and the Canadian Open in golf.

Ernie is married and has one daughter.

WENDY CLARKSON



Wendy Clarkson is currently the top young badminton player in Canada. A native of Glasgow and a former resident of Edmonton, she moved to Calgary in 1974 to take advantage of the superior coaching available here. Since that time, her career has skyrocketed.

In 1975 she won the Canadian Junior Triple Crown, was on the Senior Mixed Canadian Championship team and was named to the Uber Cup Team. In 1976, she was a finalist in the World International Singles, was a quarter finalist in the all-England Championships, was the Canadian Champion, reached the Canadian semi-finals in both

doubles and mixed doubles, was a finalist in the Mexican Open and was the Canadian Open Champion. Wendy has already been named to the Uber Cup Team for 1977.

It is a privilege to recognize this young, international class athlete.

LARRY RINKE



Larry Rinke is 20 years old and has been without his sight since he was 10 years old. A native of Blairmore, Alberta, this young man has distinguished himself in both cross country skiing and wrestling.

This year he won the 5 kilometer event in the North American Cross Country Skiing Championships for the blind which was held in Vermont. He made the Alberta team for the 1976 National track and field and wrestling championships for the disabled but had to miss the event due to an ear drum injury. He placed 2nd in the City High School Wrestling Championships in 1975 and 3rd in 1976. He also won the High School Round-Robin Invitational Meet in 1976.

Larry has recently become a track enthusiast and is currently training with the Calgary Track and Field Club.

ATHLETES



ARNE SORENSEN

Arne Sorensen is an outstanding rifle shooter and has won so many awards that to list them would almost fill this entire program.

Prior to his coming to Canada, Arne won three junior shooting championships in his native Denmark. In 1960, he joined the Calgary Rifle and Pistol Club and proceeded to win the Lieutenant Governors Championship three times, the Dominion of Canada Grand Aggregate Championship three times and qualified for the Bisley team on ten different occasions.

In order to get more international competition, Arne switched to small bore competition and was a member of the bronze medal winning Canadian team in the 1971 Pan-Am Games. He represented Canada in the Munich Olympics in 1972, won the bronze medal for individual competition at the 1975 Pan-Am Games and represented Canada in last year's Montreal Olympics where he finished sixth.

Arne has won the Canadian National Shooting Championship six times and the Alberta Championship 10 times.

He lists among his accomplishments a third place finish in the 1976 Junior World Championships and a second place in the Western Division Championships. He finished second in the 1977 Senior Men's Canadian Single Competitions and has recently competed in the Skate Canada (International) Competitions and in the 1977 World Figure Skating Championships in Tokyo, Japan.

He trains at the Calgary Winter Club under the direction of Miss Winnie Silverthorne.

An honours grade twelve student at St. Francis High School, Brian, is also an accomplished diver, tennis player and pianist.

GUEST SPEAKER

MICKEY MANTLE

Regarded by many baseball experts as perhaps the greatest player to ever play the game, Mickey Charles Mantle, eighteen years a New York Yankee, was born in Spavinaw, Oklahoma in 1931. He signed with the Yankees in 1949 for a bonus of \$1,150.00 and a salary of \$140.00 per month and spent his first year playing class D ball.

Mantle's spectacular career began with the Yankees in 1951 when he replaced the great Joe Dimaggio in centre field, a position he played until 1967 when continued leg injuries forced him to move over to first base. Despite batting averages of .225, .245 and .237 in his final three seasons, due mainly to those nagging injuries, the switch-hitting Mantle still finished with a career average of .298.

He belted 536 homers among his 2,415 base hits. He won the American League triple crown in 1956 with a .353 average, 52 home runs and 130 RBI's. The following year he hit .365 but lost the batting title to Ted Williams.

In 1956, 1957 and 1962 he was voted the American League's Most Valuable Player. He holds the record for World Series home runs with 18 and set Series marks for RBI's, runs scored, total bases, and walks.

Since his retirement in 1969, Mantle has been involved in several business ventures and is presently assisting the Yankees as a batting instructor. He has also been spending a good deal of time attending sports dinners where he has become a very popular and much sought-after speaker.



GUEST SPEAKER

BILL MacFARLAND

Bill MacFarland is a familiar name in the hockey world. His background as a player, his experience in the management level and his educational background made him a "natural" to assume the role of President and Chief Executive Officer of the World Hockey Association.

Bill was an All-Star calibre hockey player during his college days at the University of Michigan. Graduating to the Western Hockey League, he earned All-Star status on four occasions and was named Most Valuable Player in 1962. Bill, a lawyer, passed his Washington State bar examinations while still playing hockey.

After retiring as an active player, he took over the dual coaching and managing responsibilities with the Seattle Totems. On 1970, he left the Totems to practice law on a full-time basis and in 1971, he became President of the Western Hockey League.

In 1974, he was named President of the Phoenix Roadrunners and established an exciting franchise in its first year of operation. As a result, Bill was voted the W.H.A. "Executive of the Year" by the SPORTING NEWS one year later.

Bill has had the task of guiding the W.H.A. through very troubled times and it will be extremely interesting to hear his comments on the probable future look of the league.

GUEST SPEAKER



PAUL WARFIELD

Paul Warfield is a three time all-NFL football player and is rated one of the premier wide receivers in football.

He starred both on offence and defence at Ohio State for three years. He was selected to Time Magazine's All-American eleven in 1963 and made All-Big Ten in 1962 and 1963. Paul did not miss a game in three years and led the Buckeyes in playing time with 373 minutes as a junior and 386 minutes as a senior. He played in the 1964 East-West, All-American, Hula Bowl, and College All-Star games. He also won two letters as a sprinter and long jumper in track, placing second in both NCAA and NAAU broad jumps. His best leap was 26 ft. 2 in. Paul earned a degree in physical education.

A native of Warren, Ohio, Warfield participated in football, basketball and track at Warren Harding High School and rejected several major league baseball offers to attend Ohio State University. With the Buckeyes, a team noted for its running game, Warfield gained All-America honors as a receiver, ball carrier and defensive back. He was the Brown's No. 1 draft choice in the 1964 draft.

Warfield played the first 6 of 11 years in the NFL in a Brown's uniform and was an outstanding performer. He caught 52 passes as a rookie and his 1067 yards in 1968 still constitutes a Cleveland record.

In early 1970, Warfield was traded to Miami for the Dolphins' No. 1 draft choice, a trade that brought Mike Phipps to Cleveland. He continued to star at Miami where he equalled his Cleveland feat of being chosen All-Pro three different seasons. He has played in the Pro Bowl 7 times in his 11 year NFL career.

Married and the father of a daughter and a son, the 6 ft., 185 lb. member of the Cleveland Browns has resided in the Cleveland suburb of Beachwood for the past decade. This winter he has been a sportscaster on a Cleveland radio station and he is hopeful of making this his career after football.

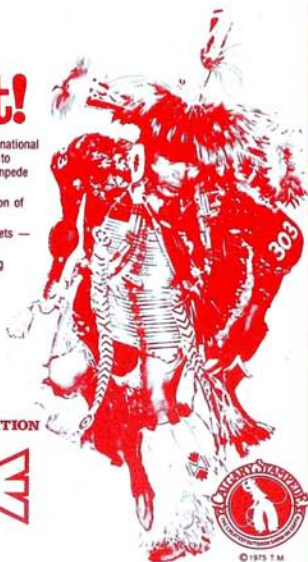
